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#### **OUR LOGO**

The NWTS logo represents the centrality of Christ in the history of redemption. The XP (Greek letters chirho) are the first two letters of the name Christ (Christos-Χριστος). The vertical (eschatological) arrow represents the intrusion or revelation of God's Word into history. The horizontal (temporal) arrow represents the line of redemptive history. The intersection of revelation and history is centered in Christ Jesus, our Savior, From Creation to Consummation—Christ Jesus, At every point where God's revelation touches history, Christ Jesus is preeminent-Christoce ntrically, eschatologically, soteriologically (Lk. 24:44-47).

# Our Story

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The husband and wife are sitting in the doctor's office anxious to hear the results of the tests. As the doctor enters the room, the news is already announced by his body language. The words just drive it home, "The biopsy shows cancer. It has spread throughout your body. The prognosis is

not good." The wife turns to her husband for words of comfort. for hope. He lovingly looks into her eyes and says with great conviction, "It will be all right. I know it will be." I should have known what was coming the moment the scene began. But caught off guard, I start yelling at the television, "How do you know it will be all right? Are you God? Do you know the future? Can't vou give vour beloved wife more than that?"

The words of this actor tell us resurrection which the truth of the situation for so brings hope and many people. When times of comfort. frowning providence appear in the lives of those they love, they have no real hope or comfort to give. The world of the flesh can only pretend to be god and spout worthless platitudes and give blind predictions about the future. They have no one to bring them the true words of comfort and hope.

These types of situations should dearly show the difference between the world of the flesh and the world of the Spirit. In the world of

faith, the believing wife can turn to her Christian husband for comfort, and he can compassionately say, "It will be all right. For Jesus has promised to never leave us or forsake us. His rod and staff will comfort us as we go through the valley of the shadow of death." The Christian husband does have

hope and comfort to give. That Christian wife does have hope as she faces cancer and probable death. She has Christ and all the promises of his Word of God which is kingdom which give comfort in this life and hope for the life to come.

> But this scene should not be limited to the doctor and the couple. For the burden that this couple is facing is so heavy that it should not be faced alone. The minister should also be present. The Form of Government of the Orthodox Presbyterian Church states that a pastor is to "minister to the

poor, the sick, the afflicted and the dying."

Frowning providence often hits so hard that the sick, afflicted or dving and their loved ones need the support of the shepherd lest they stumble under the weight of the burden. The pastor comes equipped with the Word of God which is sufficient for every circumstance. For the sick, afflicted and dying, there can be no other balm but Christ.

For it is His life, death and resurrection which brings hope and comfort. The minister comes to help his sheep find their life in Jesus and not in this world. He comes to remind them of what they already know, that their union with Christ makes them heavenly citizens and that the sufferings of this earth will soon pale when compared to the glory of their heavenly citizenship with Christ for all eternity (Phil. 2:20; 2 Cor. 4:16-18; Rom. 8:18).

Northwest Theological Seminary is striving to equip men with the ability to handle rightly the Words of the Good Shepherd, that they might be pastors who will properly minister to the poor, the sick, the afflicted and the dying. Men who understand that true pastoral care involves helping the Christian find their hope and comfort in Christ Jesus alone. Men who believe that true pastoral care involves taking the time to care for each member individually in their time of distress. Pray that God will raise up compassionate pastors who will reflect the eschatological shepherd, Jesus Christ.
