

After Graduation and Kerux conference, I had the privilege of preaching in Corvallis, OR, Bothell and Lynnwood, WA. Then I was able to return to writing and research. This occurred in conjunction with the Reformed Confessions project

of which I am general editor. The goal is to gather and publish, in English, all the Reformed Confessions of the 16th and 17th centuries. The fascinating aspect of this research is learning that Reformed Confessions were drafted not only in Germany, Switzerland, France, Holland and Great Britain (as expected), but that the Calvinistic Reformation reached Poland, Hungary, Transylvania and even Lithuania. I have compiled a list of approximately 120 Reformed confessional documents -- more than

60 of which have never before been translated into English.

The first document to be rendered in English for this project was translated by the Ecclesiastical Latin class at NWTS for the academic year 2004-2005. The "Bentheim Confession (1613/1617)" of Germany appears in English for the first time in the September issue of Kerux: The Journal of NWTS. It was great fun for our class to perfect this translation.

My hope is that the Reformed Confessions project can be completed in 2 or 3 years. Translators for Latin, German, Polish, Hungarian, French and Dutch documents are still needed. If you are interested, or know someone with ability in one of these languages, please contact me at the seminary.

It was my privilege and honor as president of the board of Northwest Theological Seminary, to preside over the first commencement exercises of the seminary held on May 14, 2005 and to confer the degree of Master of Divinity upon our first

graduate, Mr. Adam D. King. It was an historic occasion and it is my continual prayer that Adam is but the first in a long list of graduates from our fine institution.

I firmly believe that Adam has received one of the finest theological educations available today. The catalogue for NWTS states that the Master of Divinity program at Northwest "is a 3-year program, which equips qualified men

pursuing ordination with the necessary preaching and teaching skills and knowledge to begin their ministry" (p. 4). Simply put, Northwest exists to

Dr. William Dennison Teaches Apologetics, Systematics

This year's Spring concentrated classes were post-poned due to illness of Professor William D. Dennison. They were rescheduled for August, and that made it possible for some additional listeners to attend. The Introduction to Systematic Theology included about a dozen students, four of whom were taking the class for credit. Class began with a discussion of the relationship between theology and philosophy, followed by ancient Greek theology and philosophy from Homer to Plato and Aristotle. Modern critical theology was traced from Bacon and Descartes, moving through the



Enlightenment to recent theologians like Barth, Bultmann, Pannenber g and Plantinga. Having set the stage with this foundation, professor Denni-


The NWTS staff is sponsoring our second annual Christmas carol sing at the Lynnwood OPC on December 3 at 7:00 PM.

train knowledgeable and competent preachers of the gospel who will by God's grace be used by him to gather and perfect his elect, to build up Christ's church, and to bring glory to God's name. When our students have completed their



formal training, it is our prayer that they are pre-

pared "to begin their ministry" of proclaiming that gospel message.

It is that gospel message which is all important. It is the message needed for this lost and needy world. It is the message of salvation. Paul puts it this way in 1 Corinthians 1:21, "...God was well pleased through the foolishness of the message preached to save those who believe."

Men trained at Northwest receive preparation to begin their ministries of prodaiming the gospel. But we believe that this formal training is just a beginning. When they preach the gospel, others will be listening to that message. But it is our desire to instill in our graduates that they themselves continue throughout their ministries to be listeners to the message that saves. They must diligently read the message in their own devotional life. They also need to hear that message preached and taught by others. And they need to take heed to the message so that their lives might by God's grace reflect that true religion and true ethic that has come down to us from heaven itself. May our graduates be listeners to the message proclaimed because that message is for their own salvation.

The men trained at Northwest must also be faithful preachers of the message to others. They have been taught to identify the relentless attack of Satan and this world of unbelief upon that message. The world rejects the scriptures







Christina and I are now in our second year of


